BEFORE GOING TO THE THEATRE

1. The Story

Victor Frankenstein, a young scientist, becomes obsessed with creating life and makes a creature from body parts, which he animates. Horrified by his own creation, Victor abandons the Creature, who, despite seeking acceptance, faces rejection and isolation due to his monstrous appearance.

Victor's fiancée, Elizabeth, who knows nothing about the monster being alive, warns him about playing God. Victor convinces her that she has nothing to worry about and they make plans for their future together. Victor's younger brother, William dies while playing in the park.

Saddened by his brother's death, Victor takes pity on the monster and creates a female companion for him. He becomes worried about them reproducing and populating the world so he destroys her. The monster sees this and takes revenge, killing Elizabeth. Victor flees knowing that the monster pursues to kill him too. He freezes to death in the Arctic Circle before the monster gets to him.

5. THE AUTHOR: Mary Shelley

Mary Shelley started writing *Frankenstein* in 1816 when her friends held a competition to write a scary story. Her friends included the famous poets Percy Shelley and Lord Byron.



Shelley's story was inspired by some gruesome scientific experiments that were happening during her lifetime. Some scientists were experimenting with using electricity to reanimate dead animals, such as frogs. In 1803, they even tried to reanimate a human body.

These experiments were not successful, but Shelley used them as inspiration for Victor's creation. She explored society's fears about what might happen if these experiments succeeded.

Young women were not expected to have careers at this time so she published the book anonymously, hoping that people would take it more seriously. In 1831, when it had become a success, it was republished under her real name.




